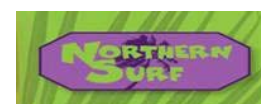

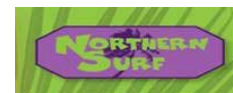

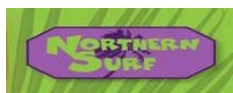

Under 13's – Round 4

Vs Bayswater-Morley Dec 7th Kingsway 1

Round 4 saw us play our first home game for the season. After the previous 2 wins the boys (and coaches) were eager to see how we would perform against the highly fancied Bayswater-Morley outfit. Captain Tom Rankin lost the toss and Bayswater-Morley elected to set us a target. Opening bowlers Alex Maley and Jarryd McPhee both bowled tightly and with some outstanding efforts in the field kept the Bayswater scoring to a snail's pace. A bowling change brought quick results with Tom Rankin bowling the opener while Conor Moldrich tied up the other end. Braden Quinn chipped in with the second wicket in the 18th over, with the score only on 43. Jake Lewis at the other end bowled extremely tightly. His four over spell, while wicketless, cost 2 runs, scored off the last ball of his fourth over.

The spin twins Josh Wright and Mason Coad then set about the Bayswater batsmen creating numerous opportunities. Unfortunately we failed to capitalise on many of them but Mason did manage to snare himself 2 wickets. The quicks came back on with 5 overs to go, with Jarryd picking up 2 wickets and Conor 1 and restricting the scoring from the last five overs to about 10. After 40 overs Bayswater Morley were 8 for 105

With an asking rate of just over 2 and a half an over the Wanneroo batsmen were confident, but not cocky. Openers Josh Philippe and Luke Borello started brightly, until Josh played around one to be bowled for 5. Jake Lewis joined Luke with the score at 1/10 and the two set about chasing down the runs. With both boys batting beautifully and picking up singles almost at will, they never really looked troubled and passed the target in about the 32nd over. Almost immediately, a rush of blood saw Luke stumped on 50 with the partnership realising 97 runs. Jarryd McPhee came and went and the run rate slowed as Jake neared his second fifty in a row. Shortly after passing the milestone, he was LBW for 51. Jesse Budge and Brendan Murray then took the final score to 4/144 from our allotted 40 overs. A great win by any standard.

Under 13's – Round 1 (rescheduled to 14th Dec)

Vs Midland-Guildford Dec 7th Kingsway 1

After the confidence boosting win of the previous week, and less than 20 runs separating the teams, the Roo boys were fired up for their top of the table clash with Midland-Guildford. Skipper Jarryd McPhee won our first toss of the season and promptly elected to bat on what looked like a typical Kingsway belter. Openers Brendan Murray and Jarryd McPhee took to the much vaunted Midland-Guildford attack, scoring at nearly 4 runs an over until Jarryd was forced to retire hurt on 40 with a calf injury. Luke Borrello joined Brendan and kept the rate ticking over, but the introduction of the spinner and the subsequent loss of Brendan for 31, Luke for 7 and the unlucky Alex Maley for 1 slowed the scoring rate considerably. Jake Lewis and Tom Rankin saw us through a tricky patch until Jake was undone by the re-introduction of the opening bowler. Tom and Josh Wright then set about picking up the scoring again until, in search of the big shot, Tom was bowled for a very handy 20. Josh Philippe joined Josh Wright and hit a quick 13 to take the final score to 5/159, our highest of the season.

While happy with our batting effort, we knew we could not afford to be complacent against a healthy Midland Guildford line up. An early wicket to Jake Lewis and tight bowling from Max Walters did little to curb the aggression of the other Midland-Guildford opener as he attacked anything loose once he got his eye in. Fielding was tight, with very few singles on offer, but anything short or wide was promptly hit for 4 as he dominated the change bowlers. A sharp piece of fielding from Tom Rankin at cover saw him run out for 36 of the side's total of 43. Even with the aggressor gone the MG boys still scored quickly, at around 4 runs an over, until Tom Rankin and Callum Wiggers put the brakes on and were both rewarded with wickets. Spinners Josh Wright and Mason Coad were initially expensive, but

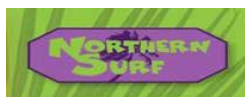

Do You Know the Rules?

Law 37 (Obstructing the field) (Sections 1 - 4 only)

1. Out Obstructing the field

Either batsman is out 'Obstructing the field' if he willfully obstructs or distracts the opposing side by word or action. It shall be regarded as obstruction if either batsman willfully, and without the consent of the fielding side, strikes the ball with his bat or person, other than a hand not holding the bat, after the ball has touched a fielder. See 4 below.

2. Accidental obstruction

It is for either umpire to decide whether any obstruction or distraction is willful or not. He shall consult the other umpire if he has any doubt.

3. Obstructing a ball from being caught

The striker is out should willful obstruction or distraction by either batsman prevent a catch being made. This shall apply even though the striker causes the obstruction in lawfully guarding his wicket under the provisions of [Law 34.3 \(Ball lawfully struck more than once\)](#).

4. Returning the ball to a member of the fielding side

Either batsman is out under this Law if, without the consent of the fielding side and while the ball is in play, he uses his bat or person to return the ball to any member of that side
